

Improving Your Child's Education

What is Title 1?

Title 1* is the nation's largest federal assistance program for schools. Rockford Elementary School receives Title 1 funds to help plan, operate, and maintain programs that support students and families towards academic success.

The goal of Title 1 is to help ALL children get a high-quality education.

Title 1 schools receive additional funding for additional resources such as: teachers, teaching assistants, research based instructional materials and programs, technology, and instructional supplies.

Title 1 helps students, teachers, and families. The program can help:

- Children do better in school and feel better about themselves.
- Teachers understand the needs and concerns of students and families.
- Parents and families understand their children's strengths and challenges.
- Parents and families be more actively involved in their children's education.

Parent Advisory Council or "PAC" meetings are held at least three times during the school year.

Math Curriculum

i-Ready Mathematics is an online program that provides students of all ages with differentiated instruction and supports them on their individual paths to success. It specifically targets the individual needs of your child in order to meet them where they are and help them be more successful. Backed by cutting-edge research on best mathematics learning practices, students gain experience through concrete examples and engaging lessons. It also has a reading component to further enhance your child's academic success. Your students use i-Ready workbooks in class to provide practice and reinforce skills being taught in class. Additionally, every class has several hand-on math manipulatives that students can use in order to develop a more concrete understanding of various math concepts.

ELA Curriculum

Wit & Wisdom is an English Language Arts curriculum developed by teachers, for teachers. Wit & Wisdom teachers and students experience the joy of reading, writing, and speaking about excellent texts while meeting the rigor of our state standards. Wit & Wisdom shares a common language from Kindergarten through 5th grade. This allows them to continue their education smoothly from one year to the

next as they review and deepen their understanding of ELA skills. W&W utilizes books and novels instead of the traditional textbook in order to place books in students' hands daily. The ultimate goal of W & W is to help develop and deepen our students' love of reading.



Testing Measures

- Three times a year, all students take the i-Ready Reading and Math Diagnostic in order to determine where each student is in their learning journey in both subjects. It also allows teachers to determine areas of need for individual students as well as the entire class.
 Teachers use this information along with classroom performance in order to guide their teaching and determine plans of action.
- State testing is normally given in late April to determine student academic growth in ELA, Math, Science, and Social Studies. Last year, we did not take it due to the CoronaVirus Pandemic. Therefore, we do not have any new school data to share this school year. However, as of now, it is expected that we will take the TCAP test in the Spring once again.
